It has been a year of reviews/audits for the Carroll County Board. We were recently reviewed by the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities and received the highest award, a three-year accreditation. The State Auditor also audited the Board. The only finding there was the need to name a records manager/custodian. Carroll Hills School was also reviewed for compliance for the 2023-2024 school year and was found to meet requirements. The Carroll County Board of Developmental Disabilities continues to perform well with all reviews thanks to our dedicated staff!

Moving forward, one area of concern is the increased cost of doing business and the increased number of people awaiting funds for service on our waiting list which is currently at eleven people. The Board continues to receive calls for eligibility, waiting list assessment for waiver funding, and notice of people moving into the county. Carroll County is attractive to people with disabilities due to having ResCare; an eight bed Intermediate Care Facility, Countryview Manor; a twenty-two bed Intermediate Care Facility, St. Johns Villa; a fifty-five bed Individual Options Waiver facility, Mayle Homes which provides housing and services for both children and adults, Family Disability Services which

provides housing and services to adults, and other private providers.

The Board's numbers for those served continues to increase even though the county's population has decreased over the years. This is why it is so important for us to plan for these increases with our Strategic Plan. The Board is committed to providing quality services and serving as many people as possible. Your levy dollars are hard at work serving 395 people with disabilities in our community.

This is the time of year when we focus on what we are thankful for and enjoy Christmas! I am thankful for so many things. I have great staff who provide quality services. I am thankful for my family, many friends, and my grandchildren.

I pray you have a Merry Christmas and a Blessed New Year. Thanks again for all the support for our wonderful Carroll County Board of Developmental Disabilities program.

Nash is an exceptionally kind and adventurous young boy. He enjoys playing with farm toys, sharing silly stories, experimenting in the kitchen, and playing alongside his friends. He is surrounded by an extremely supportive family and is looking forward to becoming a big brother in 2025. As an infant, he began his journey in the NICU, where his family discovered his hearing loss. Since that time, he has also been diagnosed with Atrial Ectopic Tachycardia (AET), respiratory distress, asthma, and specific audiological needs. Transitioning to preschool has been a significant achievement for him. He has developed the ability to separate from his family, adhere to classroom rules and routines, build friendships, and advocate for his own needs. He delights in getting messy, painting, and participating in group activities. As his teacher, I am continually impressed by his bravery, resilience, and progress throughout this school year.











Cody has made so much progress a short amount of time. He took a huge step toward independence by moving from his family home to community living with a peer, this is going exceptionally well. Cody is working with his support team to learn new skills in order to achieve his long term housing goal of living on his own with limited support. He recently celebrated his one year work anniversary at Pilot Flying J Truck Stop. Family Disability Services staff assist Cody in maintaining employment and help him work through any issues that may arise. Cody's job includes emptying the trash, maintaining the parking lot and cleaning the showers that the truckers use. These are very valuable tasks for the goods to continue moving around the country, the drivers need to rest and recharge, Cody is assisting in making that happen. He is the one of the most senior employees in this store having more tenure than most. Cody utilizes Carroll County Transit for his transportation needs to and from work. Steady employment has allowed him to attend a Cleveland Browns game and a vacation to Virginia with Mayle Homes. things he only dreamed of. Cold Weather Injury Prevention

Most people get cold injuries because of accidents, severe unexpected weather, or poor planning. Take steps to avoid cold weather injuries.

Wear warm clothing in several loose layers.

- Wear a tightly woven, wind-resistant coat or jacket.
- * Wear inner layers of light, warm clothing as well as mittens, hats, and scarves.

Make sure your equipment is appropriate for the weather, climate, and your activities.

- * In wet conditions, choose waterproof shoes that have good traction.
- * For water activities, choose an appropriately thick wet suit to prevent hypothermia.
- Use personal flotation devices. They are lifesaving if someone becomes unable to swim due to injury or the cold.

Stay dry, your body loses heat quickly when wet.

- * Sweat and wet clothing can chill the body rapidly and increase heat loss.
- If you're actively moving, remove extra layers of clothing whenever you feel too warm or start to sweat.

Do not ignore shivering.

- Shivering is an early sign that your body is losing heat.
- Constant shivering is a sign you need to find shelter and get warm.



Common Cold Injuries

In cold temperatures, heat can leave your body more quickly. Heat loss can lead to serious health effects, like hypothermia and frostbite.

Hypothermia

Hypothermia is when core body temperature drops below 95°F (35°C). Hypothermia usually occurs at very cold temperatures, but it can even happen at mild temperatures (around 50°F) if a person becomes chilled from rain, sweat, or being in cold water. People can quickly get hyperthermia in water, even in mild temperatures.

Early symptoms of hypothermia include:

- Shivering
- Feeling tired
- Clumsiness
- Confusion

As a person's body loses more heat:

- Shivering may stop.
- Skin may turn blue.
- Pupils of eyes may expand (dilate).
- Pulse and breathing slows.
- Person may lose consciousness.

If a person's body temperature is below 95°F or has any of the above symptoms, get medical attention immediately. If immediate medical care is not available:

- Find shelter indoors, in the warmest room possible.
- Remove all wet clothing.
- Warm the chest, neck, head, and groin first using a warm dry compress or electric blanket, if available. You can also use skin-to-skin contact under loose, dry layers of blankets, clothing, towels, or sheets.
- Drink a non-alcoholic or non-caffeinated warm beverage. Warm beverages can help increase body temperature. Do not try to give beverages to an unconscious person with hypothermia.


Frostbite

Frostbite is an injury that occurs when skin is exposed to freezing temperatures. Frostbite can range from mild to severe and most often affects the nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers, or toes. Frostbite is treatable, but can be severe and cause damage to deep layers of tissue under the skin.

Early signs of frostbite include numbness, tingling, stinging, or pain in areas of the body most exposed to the cold.

If you detect symptoms of frostbite, seek medical care immediately. If immediate medical care is not available:

- Move to a warmer room or shelter.
- Remove all wet clothing.
- Soak the affected body part in warm water.


