This is the time of year when we focus on what we are thankful for and enjoy the holiday season. I am thankful for great staff at the Carroll County Board of Developmental Disabilities. I just received news that our school age program “meets requirements” through the Ohio Department of Education. We were also reviewed for Preschool Step Up to Quality and maintain a Gold Star rating. I appreciate the willingness of staff to step in to meet individual needs.

I am also excited to report the progress on our Strategic Plan. The Board continues to see an increase in requests for services. Our waiting list for Waiver funding has decreased from sixteen to three. The Board increased Level 1 Waivers from forty to fifty. Ohio Network for Innovation purchased two homes that are currently undergoing renovation. The Board continues to support person centered thinking with five people attending the Synergy Conference and two people getting Project STIR training (Steps Toward Independence and Responsibility). The Board also voted to reduce our main operating levy by a half mill which will reduce property taxes next year.

I am also very thankful for my Board of Directors. Nowadays it is difficult to find people to volunteer their time. Our Board of Directors does a great job navigating this complex system and keeping us on track with our strategic plan.

I pray you have a Merry Christmas and a Blessed New Year! Thanks again for all the support of our wonderful Carroll County Board of Developmental Disabilities program.

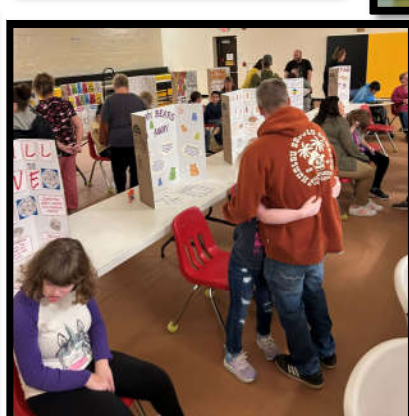
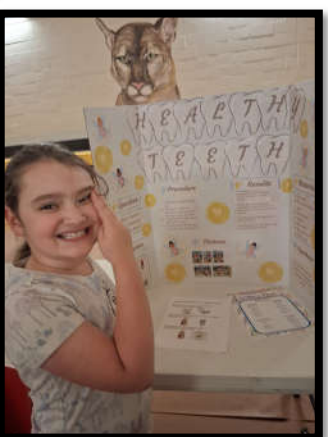

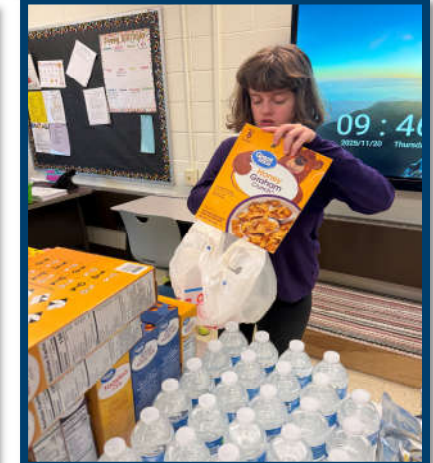


From Scarecrows to Science: A Busy Season for High School

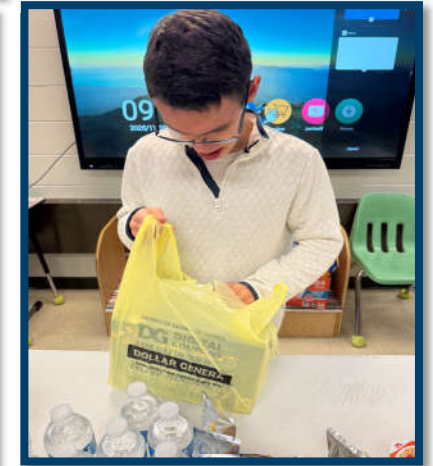

(Steps Toward Independence and Responsibility) is advocacy/leadership training designed to provide people with disabilities and their allies with the tools to advocate for themselves, work with others in advocacy and gain leadership experiences



Winter Safety



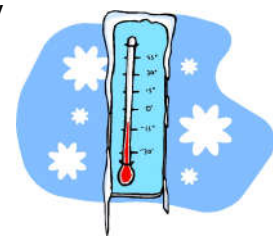
Winter safety involves dressing in layers, avoiding overexertion, preparing your vehicle and home, and preventing slips and falls. To stay warm, wear multiple layers of loose-fitting, insulated clothing and dry wet clothes immediately. When outdoors, walk slowly on icy surfaces, use non-slip footwear, and avoid strenuous activities like shoveling snow or, if necessary, take breaks and stretch first.

Personal and health safety

- **Dress warmly:** Wear layers of loose, warm, and moisture-wicking clothing to insulate your body. A hat and mittens are crucial, as significant heat is lost through the head and mittens are warmer than gloves.
- **Avoid overexertion:** Cold weather puts a strain on the heart, and activities like shoveling snow can be dangerous. Pace yourself, take breaks, and avoid pushing yourself too hard.
- **Recognize cold-weather injuries:** Be aware of symptoms of frostbite (numbness, pale skin) and hypothermia (shivering, confusion) and seek shelter or medical attention if they occur.



Stay dry: Remove wet clothing and boots as soon as possible, as wet clothing rapidly transmits cold and loses its insulating value.



Home and indoor safety

- **Prevent carbon monoxide poisoning:** Use carbon monoxide detectors and ensure generators are placed at least 20 feet away from doors and windows. Never run a vehicle's heater in a closed garage.
- **Prepare for power outages:** Have flashlights, blankets, and extra clothing on hand. Avoid using candles if possible due to the fire hazard.

Maintain your home: Ensure windows and doors are locked, and close blinds or curtains to help keep the cold out.



Outdoor and driving safety

- **Prevent slips and falls:** Wear footwear with non-slip soles and walk slowly. Take small steps and use handrails when available. Clear snow and ice from walkways to create a safe path.

- **Drive safely:** Increase your following distance, avoid using cruise control, and accelerate and decelerate slowly. Ensure all snow and ice are cleared from your vehicle, including the top, before driving.

- **Prepare your vehicle:** Have a car emergency kit with essentials like a blanket, warm clothes, a flashlight, a snow shovel, and non-perishable snacks.
